Randy Duchaine Featured in New Book of 100 Influential New York Photographers

Signing at National Arts Club Highlights Work

BROOKLYN, NY, January 18, 2010 – As one of the 100 photographers featured in a new book, *100 New York Photographers*, by Cynthia Maris Dantzic, Randy Duchaine participated in the first book signing session, held at the National Arts Club on January 14, 2010. The recognition places Duchaine squarely among the most influential New York photographers working today.

The 442-page book features contemporary New York photographers, including icons such as Annie Liebovitz, Jay Maisel, Joel Meyerowitz, Mary Ellen Mark, and illustrates the wide range of experimental, digital, and other photographic techniques employed today. Duchaine is one of few corporate photographers included in the book. Photographers converged on the National Arts Club to sign copies of the book and discuss their work. Additional signings will be held in Brooklyn and Manhattan.

“I was delighted to be featured among such a prestigious group of New York photographers,” said Duchaine. “In my work, I get to meet people who do the most interesting and unusual things. It is an empowering experience, and to receive visibility for doing what I love to do is icing on the cake.”

Duchaine’s book, *New York Waters: Profiles from the Edge*, was published in 2007 and is the first book to examine and record the lives of people who live, work, and play along

the rivers and coastal waterfronts that surround New York City. Duchaine's portraits accompany the individual profiles featured in the book and written by Ben Gibberd.
